

NEW UPDATES throughout the PDF document, yellow highlight indicates new information

- Maryland Department of Labor: A temporary office at 2501 Broening Highway near the Seagirt terminal will open starting Monday, April 22, 2024 at noon to help workers with applications for the <u>Worker Support Program</u> as well as for Unemployment Insurance. Starting Tuesday, April 23, the office will be open weekdays from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.
- Unified Command reported on April 19th that <u>a third temporary alternate channel is</u> <u>now open</u> and will provide limited access for commercially essential vessels.

**The Fort Carroll Temporary Alternate Channel, depicted in green, has a controlling depth of 20 feet, a 300-foot horizontal clearance, and a vertical clearance of 135 feet, and will facilitate additional commercially essential vessel traffic through the port of Baltimore. 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RECOVERY

- Recovery operations began March 27th for the missing workers who were on the bridge. Two bodies were recovered on March 27th and a third <u>body of a missing person</u> was recovered on April 5th. On April 15th, Salvage teams recovered a vehicle with the remains of the <u>4th victim trapped inside</u>.
- Not including the Dali, there are 136 foreign nationals on 7 ships in port. CBP is allowing shore leave and coordinating with the vessels directly.

- <u>Small Business Association (SBA)</u>: Businesses impacted by the FSK Bridge collapse are eligible for low-interest, long-term Economic Injury Disaster Loans (EIDLs) to help overcome temporary loss of revenue stemming from the bridge collapse. Eligibility applies to small businesses, small agricultural cooperatives, small aquaculture businesses, and private nonprofit organizations. The application deadline is 12/30/24.

- <u>Maryland's Francis Scott Key Response Website</u> is meant to assist workers and businesses in identifying the resources available to them. This website serves as the central location where all programs and resources will be shared as well as the locations where workers and businesses may receive in person assistance. This information will be updated as additional programs become available.
- Maryland Department of Commerce established the "Port of Baltimore Emergency Business Assistance Program" to provide up to \$100K in grants to eligible businesses. Grant funds will be awarded on a first-come first-serve basis. Incomplete applications will not be processed. Applications are available beginning April 22, 2024, and will be accepted through May 6, 2024, or until grant funds are fully obligated, whichever comes first. <u>FAQ</u>
 - In partnership with the Governor's Office and local partners launched the <u>Official State of Maryland Business Impact Survey</u>. This survey will help inform how the Port Act funding will be allocated.
- <u>Maryland Department of Housing and Community Development</u>
 - Under the April 5th executive order, DHCD is authorizing the <u>Neighborhood</u> <u>Business Works Program</u> to provide \$15 million in grants and no-interest loans to eligible businesses of 500 or fewer employees that have been impacted by a







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loss of revenue or an increase to costs relating to the Key Bridge collapse. The application portal for these programs will be open April 22, 2024.

 - <u>Unemployment Insurance Assistance</u>: Unemployment Insurance is available to eligible employees who worked in Maryland and have been laid off or are working reduced hours due to the Key Bridge collapse.  - Port of Baltimore Emergency Worker Support Program This program will provide \$430 weekly temporary relief payments during the Port's reduced operations, while funds are available. Port workers who receive unemployment insurance benefits are eligible for this program, as well as independent contractors and self-employed workers who meet the criteria.

 - April 10th, Mayor Brandon M. Scott announced <u>additional steps</u> that the City of Baltimore is taking to respond to the Key Bridge Collapse. The <u>Action Plan</u> will continue to evolve and expand as the community needs change.
 - The <u>Mayor's Office of Immigrant Affairs</u> has the <u>Baltimore Civic Fund</u> which the support is going directly to the families of the deceased and the two survivors.
 - <u>Wage Subsidy Program</u> The Mayor and the Mayor's Office of Employment Development are launching a Wage Subsidy Program to assist Baltimore City based Port-impacted small businesses in retaining their employees. The City of Baltimore is committing an initial \$1 million for this program. Eligible businesses can receive up to \$7,500 per worker in subsidy payments with a maximum of \$22,500 or 3 months of assistance per worker.

WHOLE COMMUNITY INTEGRATION

TRANSPORTATION

- The I-695 outer loop is closed at Exit 1, and the 695 inner loop is closed at Exit 42.
- <u>I-895 Baltimore Harbor Tunnel Overnight Lane Closures for April 22 25, 2024.</u> The Northbound Tunnel is scheduled to be closed at 9 p.m. on the evenings of Monday, April 22, through Thursday, April 25, for maintenance operations. Two-way operations will be in the southbound tunnel. Re-opening is scheduled to take place at 3 a.m. the following morning.
- <u>Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration (FMCSA)</u> Extension of Emergency. Declaration Under 49 CFR 39.25 No.2024-002. The US DOT and FMCSA, <u>declare that an</u> <u>emergency exists</u> to extend the emergency declaration issued by the Governor of the State of Maryland and continuing the emergency relief granted from certain







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regulatory requirements in Part 395 of the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Regulations (FMCSRs).

- Maryland Transportation Authority: Vehicles transporting hazardous materials are prohibited in tunnels and should use the western section of 1-695 around the tunnels. This includes vehicles carrying bottled propane gas in excess of 10 pounds per container (max of 10 containers), bulk gasoline, explosives, and significant amounts of radioactive materials. It is important to note that diesel fuel transports (placard 1993) are permitted in tunnels. While bearing flammable placards, these carriers are classified as hauling combustibles due to their higher flashpoint and lesser hazard to the public. Vehicles in excess of 13'-6", in height, or 96" (8 feet) in width are prohibited from using the Baltimore Harbor Tunnel. I-95 Ft. McHenry Tunnel restrictions are height 14' 6" width 11' 0".
- The public is reminded that the Unified Command continues to maintain a 2000-yard maritime Safety Zone around the incident site. The Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) implemented a <u>Temporary Flight Restriction (TFR</u>) on March 26th and it has been <u>updated as of April 9</u>. The TFR extends for two nautical miles in radius from the center of the bridge and from the surface up to and including 1500 feet above ground level (AGL). There is a zero-tolerance policy regarding any UAS/drone use anywhere within the "No Drone Zone" established by the FAA. Anyone who attempts to fly a UAS/drone in any prohibited manner may be subject to arrest, prosecution, fines, and/or imprisonment.

OPERATIONAL INFORMATION - Missing Person Recovery, Channel, Dali, Wreckage & Debris removal updates can be found <u>here</u>.

- The US Coast Guard and other lead agencies for the incident have identified three main objectives for the safe removal of the Dali. These are: 1) Remove bridge pieces from the ship, 2) Stabilize containers on the ship, and 3) Relocate the ship.
- The estimated total weight of all steel and road deck debris in the water is 27K tons (54 million lbs) Debris in the federal channel is more extensive than previously believed.
- NTSB continues its investigation and is specifically looking for large pieces of the fendering system of the bridge.
- Transponders for barge locations will continue to be installed.

Channel

- The <u>Army Corps of Engineers (USACE)</u> has <u>published a tentative timeline</u> to reopen the channel. USACE expects to open a limited access channel 280 feet wide and 35 feet deep, to the Port of Baltimore by the end of April. USACE engineers are aiming to reopen the permanent, 700-foot-wide by 50-foot-deep federal navigation channel by the end of May, <u>restoring port access to normal capacity</u>. Simulation training has begun for Pilots and tugs to learn to navigate the new channels.
- The Biden-Harris Administration <u>Approves Grant Funding</u> to Expedite Capacity Expansion for Port of Baltimore Terminal Operator, Tradepoint Atlantic.





Port Activity

- Over the next couple of weeks, six regularly scheduled roll-on/ roll-off (Ro/Ro) vessels and an additional nine redirected vessels will arrive at Tradepoint Atlantic. During that time, 10K automobiles will be unloaded and processed.
- CSX added a new freight route to transport cargo to New York while limited activity continues at the Port of Baltimore.
- Maryland State Highway Administration (SHA) Motor Carrier Division (MDC) has taken steps to make available weight permits for containerized cargo commodities heading to Maryland via alternative sea ports such as Norfolk as long as the shipping channel to the Port of Baltimore is blocked.
- <u>Tradepoint Atlantic</u> Has been an instrumental partner in supporting port activity.

Salvage

- Salvage operations on the Francis Scott Key Bridge began March 30th.
- Salvage teams are using an exothermic cutting torch to systematically separate sections of the steel bridge, which will be taken to a disposal site.
- USACE is in the process of picking up a 1K ton lifting capacity hydraulic "grab" to assist with removing wreckage from the bottom of the channel.
- Debris Reporting Hotline (410-205-6625) has received over 80 calls for service to date.
- Large capacity grabber is in transit from Galveston, TX with an ETA April 22nd.

- On April 9th, Governor Wes Moore signed into law the Maryland <u>Protecting</u> <u>Opportunities and Regional Trade (PORT) Act</u>. The bipartisan legislation supports businesses and workers who have been affected by the collapse of the Francis Scott Key Bridge. On April 5th, Governor Moore authorized <u>\$60 million</u> and a series of executive actions to respond to the bridge collapse.
